






Our prayer lives are an essential part of our Christian journey. When, where, how and why we pray are well worth some contemplation. For years I have searched for places, times and methods in my

prayer life. Let me offer just a few reflections about that journey.

As a child and even into my teenage years, I

remember too many prayers sounding something like this: "Help! I'm in big trouble!" One hopes that time, experience and wisdom gained over the years results in a deeper journey with prayer. First, I think it's important to "give thanks" for the many blessings one has received in one's life. There is wisdom in the advice that we need to deliberately focus on our blessings rather than on our problems. Giving thanks not only acknowledges the majesty and glory of God, but also reminds ourselves that there is much to celebrate in our lives. I also think it's important to "ask for forgiveness". This can allow a person to surrender to God's mercy and grace in our lives. Scripture promises that when we

In the busyness of life we often "send up" quick prayers and request for God's intervention but how often do we truly take time to commune with God in the sanctity of prayer? Even if we were to carve out 15 minutes a day, would that potentially change our attitude and perspective about life?

If you haven't heard John Rutter's version of For the Beauty of the Earth you are in for a real treat. Go online, tune in and relax to this very moving piece of splendid music.




