Are You a Good Samaritan to Your Neighbours? (Luke 10:25-37)

I think that the Good Samaritan story is about extravigant generosity, unbelievable compassion and quite simply restores our faith in humanity. This story contains a transformational message beyond common social norms and leads us to consider what our responsibility to our neighbours may be. The story itself seems quite simple. It begins with an unexpected event when someone is wandering in a dangerous part of town resulting in him getting robbed, mugged and beaten. Our storyteller, Jesus Christ, has a priest and a Levite pass by the gruesome scene. It is a Samaritan who chooses to take the enormous risk of stopping to help a neighbour. He not only bandages his wounds but takes him to a place where he can heal and rest. In this extraordinary story the Samaritan even agrees to pay any extra expenses that his wounded neighbour may incur. Hadn't he already done enough? Indeed, hadn't he already done more than enough? Clearly the story is about more than a "casual handout".

We are encouraged to help and support our neighbours. The only way we can really do that successfully is to take the time to get to know them. Perhaps a situation will occur this summer in your neighbourhood where one of your neighbours will need your assistance. Perhaps it's helpful to remember the words from scripture, "Love the Lord your God with all your body, mind and spirit and love your neighbour as yourself."

The summer time can provide an opportunity for us to get to know our neighbours in new ways. Perhaps we arrange a BBQ or a visit to the pool or maybe a simple chat while washing our cars. One theologian talked about the importance of getting to know our neighbours at a transformational level. Herbert O'Driscoll wrote about the Good Samaritan story. He said, "When Jesus makes His central character a Samaritan, He extends the concept of neighbour far beyond the conventional bounds of social acquaintances and traditional lifestyles. Jesus seems to suggest that true neighbourliness is created by reaching beyond these easy and comfortable commonalities."

I remember a story about a husband and wife who had been happily married for 50 years. Every morning they shared breakfast together at the kitchen table. Their morning view was a huge window that looked upon their neighbours. The woman often commented upon the activity in the neighbourhood. Her husband often said, "It's none of your buisiness." One day the woman happened to be looking out the window and watched a small child playing on the edge of an above ground pool. Suddenly the child disappeared. The woman raced to the telephone. She called the police and fire department. Within moments the child was rescued from the pool. Her well-intentioned concern for her neighbours saved the child's life.

May we all be well-intentioned prayerful neighbours this summertime.
