And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes.

'Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth.'

C: Therefore God, we who seek your reconciliation; we who need reconciliation one with another; we who hope for reconciliation with all creation, draw close to this mystery.



A Note from our Treasurer and our Executive

As you are aware, monies can be directed to St. Georges in a number of ways. For accurate tracking of these monies, please ensure that you have indicated the purpose for the payment/donation. This is true for payments/donations received whether they be via cash, cheques, and/or E-transfers. In particular, if you are giving using envelopes, please clearly indicate your wishes for the donation using the available pre-printed lines on the front of the envelope. If you are using cheques rather than cash, please indicate the purpose of the cheque in the comment section to the left of your signature. If you are using E-transfer, please indicated the purpose of the e-transfer in the note section of the E-transfer. If you just use a plain envelope, please put your name, address, amount of the donation/payment, and a note as to the purpose(s) of the donation on the front of the envelope and seal it. Your assistance in these matters is greatly appreciated!

A Note re the Discretionary Fund Account from your Executive

You may or may not be aware that we have a Discretionary Fund Account to which donations are accumulated from our parishioners for extraordinary funds to individuals in need. These are distributed by our Rector as required throughout the year. The Account is very low or zero at the moment and needs to be replenished. In the past, it has had about \$1,000 in it with the amount varying as needs are met. Our thanks for any assistance that you can give in this area.

Deanery Refugee Update

Our committee met on Monday Sept. 15th for two and a half hours. 8 of our 12 churches had representatives; at least two new individuals have joined our group. After considerable discussion, we decided we were not in a position to select a new family until at least mid-October (their arrival would be 2 to 8 weeks later). Significantly, we are still not entirely clear about the various rules by the Diocese and by the government that now determine funding and budgeting. Additionally, we could use a few new committee members to eventually fill roles on some of our sub-committees: education, medical needs, transportation. We are in good shape for furniture, finance/family budgeting, government forms and agencies, shopping, and social connections.

Not surprisingly, we could use further financial support from our twelve churches. As Treasurer, I calculated that for our last family (who arrived on Feb. 22, 2023) we spent \$35,769.26 to fund them for their first year (until March 1st 2024). Rent alone was roughly \$23,400. We have \$13,650 presently in our account. We do not need all of our funds up front, but we do need our churches to continue to give what they can to continue our work in aiding and rescuing families who need to flee their circumstances in distant countries.

BRITISH HOME CHILD DAY ACT, 2010

British Home Child Day is intended to recognize and honour the contributions of the British home children who established roots in Ontario. Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:

- 1. September 28 in each year is proclaimed as British Home Child Day.
- 2. This Act comes into force the day it receives Royal Assent.
- 3. The short title of this Act is the British Home Child Day Act, 2010

These children were sent to Canada and other Commonwealth countries from Great Britian by church and philanthropic organizations on the belief they would have a better chance to live a healthy and moral life. The organizations believed that Canadian families in rural Canada would welcome them as a source of farm labour and domestic help. There was also a shortage of young men to work the fields after the First World War.

The experience faced by many of these children was harsh. With little monitoring by the organizations involved, many children faced considerable challenges and tremendous hardships. They were considered indenture servants, denied a proper education.

Many suffered serious and sustained abuse in the new homes. (My own father was forced to sleep between the cows in the barn in Tweed, Ontario. On Sunday, it was his job to pump the church organ in town. The farmer and his wife passed by him in their buggy as he walked into town.) Many children were sad, lonely and malnourished. Others were emotionally starved. Siblings were usually separated and never saw each other again. Many suffered shame as they were treated as less than and never told their families of their early life in Canada. With remarkable courage, determination, perseverance and strength, these children overcame the obstacles before them. Most established roots in Canada and in Ontario and went on to lead productive lives and contribute to the economy of Ontario. There are many descendants in Ontario. It is estimated that one in ten Canadians are descendants of a British Home Child.

Many places across Canada including the pedestrian walkway in Cambridge will have blue lights shining on the evening of September 28th to honour and remember these children
