Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus.

² To Timothy, my beloved child:

Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

³ I am grateful to God—whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did—when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. ⁴ Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. ⁵ I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. ⁶ For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; ⁷ for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline.

⁸ Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, ⁹ who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, ¹⁰ but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Saviour Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. ¹¹ For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, ¹² and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. ¹³ Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. ¹⁴ Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.

A: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.


C: Therefore God, we who seek your reconciliation; we who need reconciliation one with another; we who hope for reconciliation with all creation, draw close to this mystery.

Outreach - Foodbank

- *The outreach committee has made a change to the Foodbank donations that we need you to know about.
- *In the past we have asked for food items to be brought in for donation and once a year the outreach budget would also send them a cheque.
- *The foodbank donation bin and the St. Andrews donation bin often become confusing sitting side by side.

The foodbank has indicated that when we give a monetary donation, they can obtain twice the amount of food items than what we donate. In other words---if you go to the store and purchase \$8.00 worth of items, you may get 6 items if you are lucky. If you give the foodbank \$8.00, they can purchase 12 items. \$8.00 can provide meals for 4 people when you give a monetary donation.

We feel this is the way that we can best contribute to our community the most to help people who suffer from food insecurity.

If you wish to make a monetary donation to the food bank:

- *if you use giving envelopes beside the outreach column, write Foodbank and the amount of your donation.
- *if you use direct deposit- it would be easier to take any envelope you have and put Outreach-Foodbank donation on it with the amount you are donating, along with your name and address
- *as of today, the Foodbank donation bin has been removed.

If you just use a plain envelope, please put your name, address, amount of the donation/payment, and a note as to the purpose(s) of the donation on the front of the envelope and seal it. Selection Committee Formed

On Thursday, September 25, our Archdeacon, Rev Rob Lemon, from Stratford, chaired a special Parish Council Meeting wherein the following parishioners were approved as your Selection Committee whose sole purpose is to realize a new Rector: Adam Ashcroft, Catherine Carlson, Nelson Cuthbert (Chair), Ray Finnie, Kathy Glaser, Yvonne Gingrich, Fran Rothenberg, and Debra Zanon-Barclay.

Here are some key "process" points for you:

- Archdeacon Rob Lemon is our Diocesan Advisor and our direct link to the Bishop. It is under the Bishop's authority that the work of this Committee proceeds.
- Under Diocesan rules, Rev Sharla is not part of the process.
- The timeframe will be six months approximately.
- All committee members have signed a Diocesan "Confidentiality Agreement" wherein all details of meetings, interviews, etc. are in confidence forever.
- General process milestones will be shared with St. George's throughout the process.
- We will be meeting regularly to accomplish the following:
 - o Create an all-parishioner questionnaire for you to complete and return to us; summarize all of those responses.
 - oUse the Summary and other information to compile a detailed Parish Profile.
 - oForward the Summary and the Parish Profile to the Bishop.
 - oAwait a response from the Bishop including the names of prospective candidates to interview. All candidates get copies of the Summary and the Parish Profile.
 - oInterview prospective candidates; decide on the best fit and inform the Bishop. The candidates also report their post-interview decisions to the Bishop.
 - Await the Bishop's response. Hopefully, all parties (The Bishop, St. George's Selection Committee, and the chosen candidate) are still in agreement.
 - olf successful, announce the name of the new Rector and work out the many details with respect to such items as salary, start date, Rectory, etc.

There you have it! We have a strong team and a definite desire to accomplish our work in the next couple of months. Please pray for us. Thanks very much for your support!
